
# Maiden Newton-Bridport Trailway Newsletter Issue 4

Welcome to Issue 4 of the Trailway Newsletter, and sorry it's been so long since the last one! However, the project is ongoing, and negotiations are moving forward with various landowners between Maiden Newton and Bridport.

### Summary of Progress so Far

- 1) The Maiden Newton to Chilfrome Lane section has been re-surfaced and widened, and bins for dog mess installed at each end.
- 2) Dorset Wildlife Trust has agreed in principle for the Trailway to run over Powerstock Common. Bridleway access to the old railway at Powerstock Common has been resurfaced.
- 3) A £5000 grant has been received from Dorset AONB for path construction it has been used for the advance purchase of materials.
- 4) Art projects funding has been agreed with Arts Council England, along with the Dorset Design and Heritage Forum's Wide Open Space funding.
- 5) A section of the old railway at Loders has been purchased by Sustrans from Magna Housing.
